And sustainability and environmentally friendly light-ing are slowly gaining impor-tance. "From people randomly picking up lamps from local stores to homeowners scouting for lighting designers, there has been an evolution," says Arjun Rathi, founder at Arjun Rathi

This is where accent lighting comes in. "Accent lighting helps bring life to any object or space," says Dewangi Lad, director at Prodigio Designs. She used this lighting trend recently for one of her clients who has a view of the sea link. Lad created a series of light frames around the window from where the view was visible, making it look picture perfect. "My client says it's the most soothing way to highlight the house at night."

seome.com too is a fan of this trend. "I have used spotlights in many projects to highlight family portraits or art pieces in home spaces," he says.

When you're working out lighting, consider creating a dra lighting, consider creating a dra-matic glow by using lights in unusual shapes. "They act as a statement piece, and add intrigue and character," says Natasha Jain, CEO of Bent Chair. You could hang a figure of Cupid holding a bulb wire from the celling or get a table lamp in shape of a pug—Jain says there are tons of examples reflecting are tons of examples retrecting this trend.
